

- 2. Birding-related items only: birding gear, bird books, bird photos, bird paintings, bird sculpture, bird houses, bird baths, bird feeders, bird décor, bird jewelry, bird note cards, bird ornaments, plus, of course, binoculars, walking sticks, new or slightly used and very clean birding clothing and hats (no seed caps, please), and so forth that are in excellent condition.
- 3. No taxidermy please (no stuffed birds!).
- 4. No bird seed.
- 5. No baked goods.
- 6. The auction will run from set-up Friday evening until 15 minutes prior to start of the banquet Saturday evening. This will give winners time to pay for and pick up their items before the banquet and evening's program.
- 7. One added rule is that if we receive several copies of one item, we may hold back the extra copies until the next auction, or sell them on eBay.

If you have an item for the auction, but are unable to attend the Spring Meeting, please ask a friend to bring it or let me know and I will round up a way to get your item picked up. But the best thing would be to just come.

uring SDOU's annual meeting, 16 January 1950, members adopted new by-laws that replaced the three-member Executive Committee with a fifteen member Board of Directors elected in three, five member classes. In a related change, the Board of Directors acquired responsibility to elect officers who in turn must be directors. In addition to the newly-elected fifteen members of the Board of Directors, the March 1950 issue of *SD Bird Notes* listed a new President, Dr. Gerald B. Spawn, a new Vice-president, J.S. Findley, and a new Editor/Librarian, Herman F. Chapman. W.B. Mallory and S.H. Rames continued as Secretary and Treasurer, respectively.

In this issue, a "President's Page" appeared for the first time in *SD Bird Notes*. President Spawn, in reviewing SDOU's early achievements and opportunities, remarked that enjoyment of the out-of-doors "can be greatly increased by...interest in the birds that make their homes in our community and those that pay us a brief visit while migrating through our area". Believing many South Dakotans are interested in birds, President Spawn urged members to recruit new members, as well as to renew their own memberships for 1950.

The appearance of an article by Charles Rogge evoked grateful memories of this old friend. Charles brought to my attention the use of a spotting scope mounted on a sawed-off rifle stock. Over the years this tool enhanced my avian observations.

In the article, "Snowy Owls in South Dakota", Rogge listed the reports of Snowy Owls during the winter of 1949-50, as reported by members and game wardens. Most occurrences were in the eastern half of the state with fairly numerous sightings in the Aberdeen, Sisseton and Webster areas.

Refuge manager F.T. Staunton wrote about the Waubay National Wildlife Refuge in this issue's section "Sanctuary! Sanctuary!". According to Staunton, "Waubay" is an Indian term for "meeting place for birds", which may reflect the Sioux peoples' impression of the area that became the Waubay Refuge. Over time, increasing agricultural usage reduced the area's waterfowl production. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service thus developed the refuge as a sanctuary to restore the place for nesting birds. Through SDOU's spring meetings and individual efforts, members have developed high regard for the refuge and the general northeastern area of South Dakota as prime habitat for nesting and migrating non-game birds.

"Notes on the Sandhill Crane," by Stephen Sargeant Visher (reprinted from the *Wilson Bulletin*, June 1910), delineated behavioral aspects of this species. Visher also noted, without mentioning a specific date, a Sandhill Crane nest in Sanborn County, a simple nest in a moist meadow with "two yellowish-green, brown-spotted eggs... kept off the ground only by a few blades of grass".

For this issue of *SD Bird Notes* in 1950, the editor wrote a review of Aldo Leopold's *A Sand County Almanac* (1949). Hermann Chapman concluded the account charmingly: "My owl-feather bookmark moved ever so slowly; there was and must still be much re-reading of this 'classic in wildlife literature.'" Anyone currently unfamiliar with this remarkable text can still share an exceptional reading experience, for the

Birders of a Feather

The summer before my first year in high school, my parents generously sent me to my first experience with birding, a camp for youth in Maine, the Coastal Maine Bird Studies. This was my first encounter with kids my own age interested in birds. They were from all over the country, but mostly from both coasts and Texas. I was the only one from the Midwest. That one week in June taught me the rudiments of not only watching birds, but of being aware of different environments and the different species that live in each habitat. The experience also highlighted the importance of connecting with people my own age who shared the same interests.

Throughout my first two years in high school I would search for someone – anyone in my school – who had the slightest interest in birds. Always with no luck. It was pure coincidence that I met Teddy Schumacher and Nevada Sorenson.

Like me, Teddy has a passion for birds: pet birds, that is. Teddy is the proud owner of two cockatiels and a devilish Quaker Parakeet, known to ornithology as the Monk Parakeet. After asking him if he ever looked at the birds outside, he confessed that he never really noticed them as much, but he wanted to learn more about them. I let him borrow my copy of Ken Kaufman's *Kingbird Highway*, and Kaufman's *Field Guide to North American Birds*.

The first time we actually went out birding was in June of 2007, to Newton Hills State Park near Canton, SD. Our target was the out-of-range Prairie Warbler being seen regularly found by Sandi Carlson, et al., and reported by Doug Chapman. We found it with little trouble. Teddy says his first birding experience was "...a lot of fun: perfect weather, beautiful locale and a rare find." I was glad that he not only understood the importance of finding a rare bird for South Dakota, but that he understood the differences in song, plumage and behavior that made this bird different from the others around it, especially the many Yellow Warblers present. Our trip that day also focused on the plant life and the swarms of butterflies that floated above the trail.

Nevada is a gifted mathematician and chemistry whiz whose interest in birds started with her discovery of an injured Mourning Dove in her driveway. She nursed him back to health only to discover that he didn't want to leave. The compassion she gained from this experience spread to the birds that she was seeing outside. "All of a sudden, these black and brown birds turned into House Sparrows, Common Grackles and Rock Pigeons," she said.

These two, plus four other of my friends have agreed to come along on our various birding outings: through bitter cold and windy to unbearably hot and sunny. While birding with my friend here doesn't get to the same level of competitiveness as it does at bird camps, it is still always an adventure. The look of awe on the faces of my friends when they closely encounter Long-eared Owls or the pre amazement at the size of a Turkey Vulture at close proximity is the best reward I could ask for. I give my thanks and highest regard to my six friends who have "endure" birding with me.

book remains in print, truly a classic, as Hermann Chapman proclaimed.

Finally, in the "I Remember" segment, W.B. Mallory spoke of exceptional nesting sites he had seen: a chickadee's nest in an open sack of chick feed, a House Wren's nest in a clothes pin bag hung on a line, a bluebird's nest in an abandoned wooden pump and a robin's nest on a railroad bridge about twenty inches from a rail.

FIRST NESTING RECORD OF A HERRING GULL IN SOUTH DAKOTA

It had been long theorized by Doug Backlund, who convinced me, that Herring Gulls probably nested on Lake Oahe. There were enough sporadic summer sightings of adult Herring Gulls to lead us to believe that a small breeding population might exist.

Background information is contained in an article on gull and tern nesting in *SDBN* 59:42, (Olson, Ricky D. Caspian Tern, Common Tern, Least Tern and California Gull Nesting Colon y on Lake Oahe). The following is a short summary of the information in that article.

Several gull and tern species have been documented breeding on Lake Oahe. Bruce Harris documented the first breeding records of California Gulls and a Caspian Tern in 1996 (Harris and Betts 1998). Least Terns, Common Terns, and Ring-billed Gulls have also been documented breeding on Lake Oahe (Tallman, Swanson, and Palmer 2002).

In 2005 I first gained knowledge of three islands in lower Lake Oahe that contained breeding populations of gulls and terns. I visited the islands on July 3, 2005. Present on the largest island were approximately 75 adult California Gulls, with young ranging from recently hatched to individuals that were

almost fledged. The smaller islands had several Common and Least Terns on nests.

On June 4, 2006 I revisited the islands with Josh Keisow and Kenny Miller. On the large island, 300+ adult California Gulls were observed with many on nests. Young California Gulls were abundant in all stages of development. But the biggest surprise were 20 Caspian Terns in a group on nests, with many Caspian Tern mates in the area. This was by far the largest Caspian Tern nesting group ever documented in South Dakota.

On June 10, 2007 I ventured to the islands again with my coworker Ray Heuer, who had so kindly taken me in his boat to the

islands for the first time in 2005. On the large island I observed over 200 adult California Gulls with many on nest and abundant young present. I also observed 17 Caspian Terns and 12 Ring-billed Gulls on nest with apparent VOL. 60, NO. 1

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mates present. This was the first time I had observed Ring-billed Gulls nesting on Lake Oahe. The smaller islands contained Common and Least Terns on nests.

I experienced some apprehensive excitement on this outing, as five unexpected adult Herring Gulls were also present on the large island. This inspired me to look diligently for evidence of a Herring Gull nesting. After about an hour of

circling the island in the boat, to my glee, I finally spotted a sixth Herring Gull sitting on a nest.

To document this record I digiscoped some photos. They are not the best quality, as a rocking boat is not the best base for taking pictures. I also photographed what I believe was a Herring Gull chick next to an adult Herring Gull. The chick displayed more extensive dark markings on the upper body, and a different leg color, than the many surrounding California Gull chicks. The field marks fit the description of a Herring Gull chick in my reference book (Baicich and Harrison 1978).

This is a breeding range extension of the Herring Gull in North America by several hundred miles. As the nearest documented breeding records are from northeast Minnesota and Canada (Howell and Dunn 2007). It is possible that Herring Gulls are also breeding in North Dakota. In a personal conversation with Ron Martin of North Dakota, he stated they also had breeding season sighting records of adult Herring Gulls in North Dakota, but as yet no documented breeding records.

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MEET A SD BIRDER



Bruce Harris, Clear Lake

ost South Dakota birders know Bruce Harris. He has been birding in South Dakota, except during periods when he lived and worked in other parts of the country, for the last 75 years or so. The South Dakota Ornithologists' Union's publication, *Birds of South Dakota*, all three editions, reference many species sighting records by Bruce over the years. Bruce is a founding member of South Dakota Ornithologists' Union, which was formed in 1949. He co-authored, along with several other members of the Checklist Committee, the first two editions of *Birds of South Dakota*; he has served as President of SDOU; was a long-time member of the Rare Bird Records Committee; participated as a volunteer observer for the first South

Dakota Breeding Bird Atlas; and has been a periodic contributor of articles to *SD Bird Notes* since its inception nearly 60 years ago. I recently visited with him about his passionate life-long interest in birds.

When asked what got him started in birding, Bruce observed that it was probably a series of experiences. From his infancy, he and his family were surrounded by birds every summer at the cottage his father had built in 1919, and which still remains, on Big Stone Lake. The family moved to the cottage

from town in Clear Lake every summer. His parents were both interested in birds, and he remembers as a young child his mother showing him nests of Yellow-throated Vireos and Ruby-throated Hummingbirds built right over the backyard drinking fountain. Bruce has kept a life list of sightings at the cottage, which stands today at somewhere between 80 and 90 species, at least fifteen of which have nested on the cottage grounds, which include one acre of landscaping and two acres of native woodlands along the lakeshore. Bruce remembers the first bird book published by National Geographic, which his parents kept in their library, as having excellent illustrations which boosted his interest in identifying birds.

One childhood experience of seeking out birds that still makes Bruce chuckle was a walk through a cattle pasture and into a wetland near the cottage. Startled only barely describes his reaction when an American Bittern flew

right up into his face. And then there was his sixth-grade teacher, who, each March, would engage her students in locating the first spring birds along their walk into town to school. She kept a list on the blackboard as the reports came in. Bruce kept his own list and created a regular walking route of five or six blocks before school. He still has that list. He thinks that perhaps it was that morning birding route to elementary school that cemented his love of birding.

For his twelfth birthday, Bruce received a pair of 4–power Bausch and Lomb binoculars, and these were the binoculars that went to war with him after his first year of college in wildlife biology at North Dakota State University. Bruce joined the Navy at age 19 and was shipped off to the Pacific in 1943. He still has his list of birds from his stints in the Philippines and New Guinea. It was in New Guinea where his much-loved binoculars were stolen, and he acquired a beat-up pair of French binoculars and an equally beat-up 8-power Bausch and Lomb spotting scope. His list of birds from his WWII service is 80 to 100 species, and it would have been much longer if he had been able to round up any kind of field guide for New Guinea.

Discharged from duty in 1946, Bruce went right back to college at NDSU, and then finished his Wildlife Management degree at Utah State University in Logan. He worked in California and in New Mexico for fifteen years before returning to South Dakota in 1965 to work for Game, Fish and Parks until his retirement. Over the years, Bruce has traveled the continent from as far north as Denali National Park, Alaska and Churchill, Manitoba, to as far south as the Dry Tortugas of Florida and also Mexico, and many interesting birding spots in between. He has accumulated a list so far of 619 species in the continental US, including about 350 for South Dakota alone.

He has a hard time pinpointing specific sightings that were the most exciting or most memorable. Many sightings stand out: California Condor in California the 60's, Pileated Woodpecker in Minnesota in the 60's, Worm-eating Warbler in Tripp County and McCown's Longspur in Harding County in 1970, and more recently, Great Gray Owl in Sioux Falls, White-phase Gyrfalcon near Hayes, Gray Rosy-Finch in Wyoming, and Cinnamon Teal at Willow Lake, to name just a few. As for bird behavior, Bruce says the courtship display of the Western Grebe is among the most spectacular he has observed.

Bruce's advice for beginning birders is to buy a good bird book of the area and the best seven- or eight-power (not higher) small binoculars you can afford, join a birding group or find another birder who will join you for outings, and write things down. Keep lists, keep notes about areas, and visit as many different habitats as you can.

That is great advise for all of us from one of South Dakota's premier birders.

EDUCATIONAL OASIS HOLDS RESTORATIVE POWERS

eclining in a chair behind the front desk at Sioux Falls' The Outdoor Campus (TOC), Masako Gould's snowflake socks peek under her khaki pants as her black Velcro shoes barely touch the ground. She isn't the rough, outdoorsy type people might associate with TOC, an educational satellite of the state's Department of Game, Fish and Parks. But with her less than five-foot frame and tufts of wispy hair framing her face, Masako fits in perfectly as the cheerleader for birds at TOC, an educational oasis for people of all ages and outdoor abilities.

PROIECT FEEDERWATCH

During the winter months, Masako and a group of dedicated bird enthusiasts grab their clipboards and tally sheets and cluster around the plush chairs in TOC gallery. Laminated pictures of birds decorate the crossbeams between the glass windows that line TOC's bird viewing room. Acting like tiny cheat sheets, the bird pictures help Masako and her fellow bird lovers identify the variety of feeder birds supported by TOC's simple hanging suet and elaborate multi-tiered feeders.

Every week from November through April, the group joins in a multi-country bird watch called Project FeederWatch. Organized by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and Bird Studies Canada, Project FeederWatch uses bird sighting information to track migratory patterns and distribution trends. At TOC, Masako watches for species such as the American Goldfinch, White-breasted Nuthatch and Black-capped Chickadee.

Seeing all the different species of birds excites Masako. She smiles as she remembers the day she was watching the feeders and saw fourteen mallards waddle through and take possession of the area. Over her three years volunteering with TOC, Masako has come to love and appreciate the birds at TOC. She has assumed the role of resident birdfeeder. Every morning Masako refills each of the bird feeders at the Campus. Braving all of South Dakota's extreme climate conditions, every day Masako's tiny figure can be seen replenishing the seed levels in the bird feeders. Her dedication has made TOC an urban refuge for the wildlife in the city limits.

THE BIRD FESTIVAL

Kay Gannon, teacher resource center coordinator at TOC, also plays her part in increasing wildlife appreciation at TOC. Kay organizes Flying WILD, a teachers' workshop about birds.

"I get excited about teaching teachers because they're going to change the world," said Kay, her voice bubbling over with passion for the program. Kay frames the workshop to empower teachers. The workshop informs teachers of new curriculum options, up to the state's life science standards, that they can implement in their own classrooms. After a brief overview of the anatomy, identification and adaptation of birds, the teachers plan their own activities to share at a bird festival open to the public. The bird festival falls in conjunction with the annual International Migratory Bird Day and has included activities from making birdfeeders to origami cranes and chocolate nests.

Flying WILD supports teachers in the region by exposing them to the highest level of curriculum. The Outdoor Campus believes giving teachers the knowledge and confidence they need to teach about birds will enable them to provide the best learning experience for their students. Passionate teachers provide students the best environment to learn about and appreciate the wildlife in our state.

FLOPPER

A quirky Blue Jay has risen to celebrity status at TOC. "Flopper" serves not only as a recognizable and beloved icon at the TOC, but also an educational tool. The lore goes that one windy day, young Flopper fell from her nest and was discovered by a concerned passerby. After a visit to the vet, and a few unsuccessful releases, Flopper came to live at TOC.

Flopper teaches all those who pass through TOC the philosophy "if you care, leave it there." The Campus shares Flopper's story to raise awareness about the separation between humans and wildlife. While it might seem that people are doing the right thing by rescuing wild animals, oftentimes their good intentions do more harm than good. Because Flopper was taken by humans when she was young, she was not able to successfully rehabilitate to her natural habitat. Flopper, through a process called imprinting, identified humans as her foster family and came back to people after every release.

The infamous Flopper has landed a permanent position at TOC as resident celebrity and teacher. The Blue Jay helps people get excited about learning TOC's mission. By sharing Flopper's story, TOC is able to preserve the heritage of the outdoors through education and appreciation.

SEASONAL REPORTS

The 2007 Fall Season

College of Arts & Sciences Dakota State University Madison, SD 57042

There were 305 species reported during the 2007 Fall Season. The 10-year average (1997-2006) is 301. Below, I have tried to highlight the more significant sightings (dates that are earlier/later than listed in *Birds of South Dakota* by Tallman, Swanson, and Palmer and species that are significantly out of range). For early/late migration dates, I have listed the three earliest/latest dates (by county). However, if these did not include a sighting East River, West River, and along the Missouri River, I have included the earliest/latest reported date from the missing region also. Included at the end of this report is a list of species that were not reported this year but might be expected during the Fall Season. A species is placed on the list if it was not reported this year but had been reported during fall in at least 2 of the previous 5 years. Numbers in parentheses indicate the number of consecutive years (up to 4) that the species has appeared on the list during the season. Black-legged Kittiwake and Cape-May Warbler have not been reported for the past five fall seasons and were removed from the list.

South Dakota Statewide Colonial and Semi-colonial Waterbird

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Colonial and semi-colonial waterbirds prefer to breed in high-density groups in a relatively small number of locations, favoring predator-free habitats such as flooded timber, islands, and marsh reedbeds. However, this 'all eggs in one basket' breeding strategy makes these species vulnerable to natural or manmade catastrophic events that could wipe out a large portion of the breeding population. In addition, populations have been reduced because of land-use changes leading to wetland loss, bioaccumulation of toxins, and degradation of wintering habitat. Thus many of these species are the focus of conservation efforts throughout North America.

Thirty-three species of colonial and semi-colonial waterbirds breed in South Dakota, including herons, night-herons, egrets, grebes, gulls, terns, White-faced Ibis, American White Pelican, Double-crested Cormorant, and eight shorebird species. Identifying and monitoring breeding colonies are the primary tools for tracking populations. Yet, no systematic inventories or monitoring of waterbird colonies are conducted in South Dakota, impeding the ability of conservationists to manage this vulnerable group of birds. Therefore, the first objective of the South Dakota Colonial and Semi-Colonial Waterbird Inventory and Monitoring Project was to compile an up-to-date list of waterbird breeding sites. To accomplish this, 1025 sites were surveyed for 46 species of breeding waterbirds during the summers of 2005 - 2007. Of these, 405 sites (39.5%) had confirmed breeding by waterbirds during at least one year. Of those sites with no breeding waterbirds, 43% had suitable habitat while 26.5% had extremely low water levels or were dry. While conducting the surveys, this project also collected data on colonial waterbird breeding population size at each site. Twenty-six sites were identified as being important sites for breeding waterbird colonies, defined as having more than 200 total waterbird breeding pairs and/or more than five breeding species.

Of 46 waterbird species targeted during surveys, breeding was confirmed for 32 species, individuals of another nine species were seen in appropriate habitat but breeding was not confirmed, and five species (Horned Grebe, Bufflehead, Hooded Merganser, King Rail, and Yellow Rail) were never observed during the survey. American White Pelicans and Double-crested Cormorants were the most abundant nesting colonial waterbirds in the state. Great Blue Herons were distributed in the greatest number of colonies of any species and were the most common waterbird in West River. The inventory and associated population information produced from this project will provide baseline data for future monitoring efforts, as well as contribute to regional and national waterbird conservation efforts.



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
